Upon finding the piece of paper, he read it:


"Son, I'm in the last train car!"

You LEARNED from your parents instead of disrespecting them and treating them as if they knew absolutely nothing. What they said was LAW, and you did not question it; and you had better know it!!!

When the sun was starting to set, you had better be home. In school, we listened to our teachers.

We watched what we said around our elders because we knew if we DISRESPECTED any grown-up, we would get our behinds whipped; it wasn't called abuse, it was called discipline!

We held doors, carried groceries, and gave up our seats for an older person without being asked. You didn't hear curse words on the radio in songs or TV, and if you cursed and got caught, you had a bar of soap stuck in your mouth and had to stand in the corner. "Please, thank you, yes please, no thank you" were part of our daily vocabulary!

I grew up to respect the Nation.

I am thankful for my childhood and will never forget where I came from or the era in which I was raised. I guess that is what you call the good ole days!



Survival Kit Supplies

Being prepared means being equipped with the proper supplies you may need in the event of an emergency or disaster. Keep your supplies in an easy-to-carry emergency preparedness kit that you can use at home or take with you in case you must evacuate.

What Do You Need In A Survival Kit?

- Water: one gallon per person, per day
 (3-day supply for evacuation, 2-week supply for home)
- Food: non-perishable, (3-day supply for evacuation)
- Flashlight
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (Weather Radio)
- Extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Medications (7-day supply) and medical items
- Multi-purpose tool
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies)
- Cell phone with chargers
- Family and emergency contact information
- Extra cash
- Emergency blanket
- Matches
- Map of the area

After you gather those basic supplies for your kit, add unique things each member of your family may need, such as:

- Medical supplies (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, etc)
- Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers)
- Games and activities for children
- Pet supplies (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl)
- ◆ Two-way radios
- Extra set of car keys and house keys
- Manual can opener
- Paper products & Wipes
- Sanitizer
- Rain Gear
